This was Miss Berry's first experience at teaching. She graduated from the Dover High School, class of '85, and from Pease's Commercial School in the spring of '86. A thorough scholar herself, she has striven early and late, and spared no pains, to have her scholars acquire a thorough practical knowledge of the subjects taught, and has succeeded well. Miss Berry has given some attention to reading, speaking and cultivation of the voice, a branch very much needed by a large part of the school, with marked success. The order of the school is good, and with a little more experience she will make an instructor and disciplinarian.

#### school no. 4

Summer term.—Miss Georgie Twombly teacher. Wages per month \$24; length of term 9 weeks: number of pupils registered 8; number attending each study: reading 8, spelling 8, penmanship 8, arithmetic 8, geography 6, grammar 4, history 1; average daily attendance 7.5-8; number of pupils who have not been absent 4.

Notwithstanding this was Miss Twombly's first experience as a teacher she entered upon the discharge of her duties, apparently with a determination to succeed, and through her efforts, and diligence and perseverance on the part of the scholars, we are enabled to report a successful term. Unusual interest is manifested by the parents in the welfare of this school, which is an invaluable aid to both teacher and scholars.

Fall term.—Mrs. Amanda S. Young teacher. Wages per month \$24; length of term 10 weeks; number of pupils registered 21; number attending each study: reading 21, spelling 21, penmanship 21, arithmetic 21, geography 15, grammar 12, history 5, physiology 8, book-keeping 1, algebra 1; average daily attendance 18; number of pupils who have not been absent 6.

Mrs. Young is a teacher of experience and ability, and any school, especially where there are advanced scholars, is fortunate in retaining her services. New books were introduced at the beginning of this term with apparent benefit to the school. Commendable progress was made.

Winter term.—Mrs. Amanda S. Young teacher; wages per month \$24; length of term 14 weeks; number of pupils

registered 19.

This term is still in session therefore we cannot report in full at this time.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

To the Citizens of Madbury:

We have the honor of submitting a report of the schools of the town for the past year comprising reports of districts No. 2, 3, and 4.

We accepted a place on the School Board with some doubts in regard to the wisdom of the new school law, but after a year's trial we are frank to say that it has produced results not attainable under the old law.

The average length of our school since our reports were published in 1867 were as follows: District No. 2, 264-4 weeks per year; No. 3, 201-5 weeks, and No. 4, 201-3 weeks, while this year each school has 33 weeks, with as good teachers as we ever had. As the law provides for a return to the old system after five years, by vote of the towns, we hope the legislature will allow it to remain a law till a further trial shall fully prove whether it is good or bad. A few amendments and additions would be advisable. We think there should be some person near each school house, appointed by the Board or otherwise, to look after the school property; also a provision for the disposal of money in the hands of the last prudential committees.

The board, after repeated solicitations, introduced the National Series of Readers. There were two series of arithmetics in use in the schools, namely: Robinson and Greenleaf's, with the popular sentiment in favor of the latter. The board therefore at small expense exchanged Robinson's for Greenleaf's revised, which contains all that is useful of the old and such additions and improvements as time and improved methods of teaching require. The board will furnish the readers and arithmetics to all who wish at the

wholesale price.

It has been suggested that the board furnish maps and books of reference, but we find no authority for such an expenditure, and we doubt the expediency of books of reference beyond a dictionary in our school, and as for maps, we think blackboards, extending round the room, except doors and windows, would give room enough for maps to be drawn by scholars, which would be much better.
