### GENERAL REMARKS.

CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

We are spending about \$800 a year or \$10,400 for 13 years to educate about 40 scholars. What is that education worth? What is it for? Why do we send our children about 415 weeks away from home and put them under the care, sometimes, of strangers?

Is it not to fit them for active duties of life? Is it not to fit them to better enjoy the pleasures and bear the sorrows that come to each and every member of the human family? To be an honored and respected member of society and bear its responsibilities and perform its duties in an honest and upright manner. In fact, that wherever they are they may be on an equality with the best, and be capable of earning enough of this world's goods to make them and those dependent on them comfortable under all circumstances and something for others.

While we care for them now, what is our ideal of their future, and what are we doing to have them reach that ideal? When we critizise others for their actions or want of action, what are we doing?

If our children are not what we would like for them to be, do they not get the larger part of that at home where they are most of the time, especially before they go to school, when we are their parent and teacher.

If they do not learn as fast as we want them to, what are we doing to help them along? But you may say, I have no time. Which is of the most value, a little of your time or your children's welfare? You may say, my education is limited, I had but little chance to go to school, or it was hard for me to

learn. Granted, but is not these excuses the more reason why your children should be always prompt at school that they may make up for what you cannot give them, and get a little inspiration and help from the teacher. No true teacher will refuse to help any scholar, that wants to learn, either in school or out.

Again, is your life at home just what your ideal would have your children be in the future? Should not discipline and correction commence with you and leaven the whole family. Someone has said truly that "The same rain and sun that draws from the small acorn the mighty oak, will rot the the post." The education we give our children will make them wiser and better if properly directed, but it may make them the worst criminals, if started in that direction in youth. Is not this the secret of the large number of desperate boy criminals lately caught in their downward career.

In view of these facts, what is the duty of every person in this matter? When we consider this matter, if we love our children, and no one doubts it, let us make ourselves and the environment of our children as near perfect as possible and remove from our shoulders the burden of responsibility. Then and not till then can we demand of others that they do likewise.
