#### FOREST FIRE DEPARTMENT.

This department is growing in importance each year. It is the duty of every citizen to become familiar with the state laws for the protection of forests. Nature is doing her best to increase our wealth by the annual increment of the growing forest.

The careless act of dropping a lighter match may destroy the accumulation of years.

We had two serious fires the last year, costing \$75.05 for labor in fighting, besides the labor of many public minded citizens who made no charge for what they did and for which I wish to thank them.

Beside this I had two fires reported to me by the lookout at Mt. Jobe, which on investigation proved to be one in Barrington, the other in Dover, and one fire in Durham, the expenses of which were paid by the towns in which the fires occurred.

I have investigated several small fires, attended the burning of various brush piles and granted a number of permits for burning brush, all of which were small matters and no charge made.

The deputy warden, A. W. Simpson, and myself attended a conference of forest fire wardens at Exeter and I have conferred with the state forester at his office in Concord several times.

## In Memoriam

As we chronicle the vital statistics for the year, we are sadly reminded of the fact that the death toll has been unusually large, six of our prominent citizens having passed to the "Great Beyond."

Fully realizing that the true worth of a community is the character of its people, we deeply mourn the irreparable loss to our town of these valued citizens; men of interity, sound principle, upright living. Faithful to every duty in their various walks of life, true to every position of trust and honor imposed upon them, their record is ours to commend; their memory ours to cherish.

"He cannot die who truly lives, For virtue has immortal breath; 'T is but the sowing of the grain Which blossoms into life again, And finds perfection in its death." Charles W. Hayes, a native and life-long resident, was one of the town's most influential citizens. He was a man of sterling worth who never swerved from the path of conscientious duty as he saw it, and who always had the welfare of the town at heart; his death is a serious loss. Mr. Hayes served in various town offices: Selectman, Collector of Taxes, sixteen years a member of the School Board, and twenty-two years Town Treasurer; in all of which he was actuated by the same spirit of honest dealing and strict integrity which characterized his entire life. To him, unquestionably, more than to any other man is due the credit of the town's being free from debt. Our people will ever hold him in the highest regard.

Edwin L. Jenkins, another native and life-long resident of the town, was a citizen respected and esteemed by the entire community. In the various capacities of town offices to which he was called: Selectman, member of the School Board, and Representative, his best efforts were given to further the interests of his native town, and his death is keenly felt. The passing of Mr. Jenkins removes from our midst the last vestige of a once prominent family who for generations past have been staunch citizens of the town.

Edward Pendexter, still another native and life-long resident, has recently passed from our midst. He belonged to one of the oldest and most highly respected families of the town, whose honesty and integrity were always unimpeachable. In deference to his own wishes, he was never called to fill town offices, yet his daily life among us was a strong bulwark to the welfare of the town.

Hatyville Hoitt, who resided thirty-three years in the town, was one of Madbury's oldest citizens, a substantial farmer, a man of worth to the community. His widow and only son still reside on the home farm.

James H. Colpit and William E. Allen both came into our midst from Massachusetts within a few years. During that time they formed many friendships, became well known in the town, and their loss is deeply felt.
