

To the Citizens of Madbury—

Great care must be taken in voting to raise money for Town Expenditures. Our little town is in debt and our bills must be cut to meet our income, taxes are going higher each year and unless we call a halt we shall have to sell our farms to pay our taxes.

Live stock and personal property to be taxed are growing less and the land is called upon to pay more and more.

Few people realize that our town is but a number of small farms, no village settlement, no sidewalks, sewers, electric lights, police or fire protection and only about 60 families; 330 people altogether.

There are but 7 people assessed for \$5,000.00 or over on real estate:—

It costs us too much to run our town and we must appropriate money carefully remembering that every \$1,000.00 raised means about \$3.85 rate of taxation for all of us—if we raise:—
