#### IN MEMORIAM

In the flight of time we are brought once again to the close of another year, a year which has given us the usual measure of prosperity and progress, bringing as is inevitable some days of sadness as well.

Death has entered our midst, it has touched a little life just beginning, it has removed two who were in the years of vigorous manhood and it has claimed one who was already facing the sunset of life.

Our people are saddened because of these deaths and as we record them in this report we extend to those bereft, our deepest sympathy.

Raymond E. Pinkham, son of Ansel Pinkham, and Rose Witham Pinkham, age 21 days.

Arthur W. Simpson, born in Yorkshire Eng., June 26, 1857. He came to America when 2 years of age and has lived in our Town for over 30 years, died June 8, 1922, aged 64 years, 11 months, 12 days. He was Selectman, several times, twice Chairman of the Board, was Representative to the Legislature and a good reliable citizen in ever sense that the word implies, generous to almost a fault, ever ready to assist a friend less fortunate than himself, faithful to every trust and position ever held during his useful life.

Martin T. H. Hayes, born in Madbury, March 2, 1862, son of George O. and Eliza A. (Drew) Hayes, died November 2, 1922, age 60 years and 8 months. He had been in ill health for a long time and suffered greatly.

His entire life was spent in our Town and he was a citizen respected and esteemed by all our townspeople. He lived and died an honest man.

Elizabeth H. Woodus, daughter of Nathaniel Church and Patience Hanson, born in Barrington and died July 20, 1922, aged 82 years, 9 months and 8 days. She had been bed ridden for years and was helpless but was cared for by her faithful son Charles who has devoted several years to her.

## To the School Board of Madbury:

The great problem of education in America to-day is the problem of providing better school facilities in rural communities. Educators everywhere are giving thought and evolving plans so that the boys and girls in the country places can begin to have some of the advantages that come to city children. It is the right of our children to have these advantages. They will grow up to face conditions of working and living far different from those that we had to face. There will be keen competition. Whether our children live in the city or in the country, they will have to compete with people, most of whom have had the advantage of a high school education. For their sake we should provide the best schools that we can.

The first essential for good schools is to have good teachers. It is just as important to get a trained and experienced teacher to operate on the minds of our children as it is to get a skilled and experienced surgeon to operate on their eyes or their throats. Just as much good is accomplished by the teacher who knows how, and just as much damage is done by the unskilled opera-Madbury was fortunate this year in retaining its teachers. It was difficult to get teachers at all for country places and is becoming increasingly difficult to get good teachers and to keep them. Where are the young people in Madbury that are qualified and willing to teach our schools? The condition in other rural towns is much the same. Capable teachers are in demand in the cities and villages and you do not blame them for preferring those places.

Our problem is to make teaching in our schools so attractive that we can get good teachers and keep them. One way to do this is to increase the salaries. If we lose the teachers we have, it will be hard to get others. Our teachers are worth more after this year of experience. They are worth more to other towns and should be worth more to us as they know our children and understand our problems.

A town should do more for its teachers than to pay them well. Do not make them feel like strangers in a strange land. Take them in as a part of the community. Take an interest in their work and well-being. Your obligation is to provide convenient boarding places where they will be well-cared for and where they will be contented and happy. Quite often friendliness counts more than money when a teacher decides where she will teach.

Another essential of good schools is to have good schoolhouses. The improvement made in both buildings is very plainly reflected. There is better attendance, happier children, more contented teachers, and better progress in studies than could have been possible under the old conditions. I believe it would be well, now, to replace the old double desks at the Center School with modern school furniture. Where pupils sit two in a seat the problem of order is twice as hard for the teacher. The time and attention that she has to give to discipline is time lost from teaching and a distinct loss to the pupils. It is not good for the pupils to sit together. While one is studying, the least move by the other will attract attention and prevent pupils from forming those mental habits of concentration, attention, and diligence in study which should be formed in early years. This is the reason, I believe, why the single desk has been universally adopted in city, village and country schools, just as the double-desk of 1860 drove out the rough and backless benches of an earlier time. The desks should be suited to the size of the children. In a large school there might be four different sizes, but with our school, I believe it would be better to have adjustable furniture that can be raised or lowered according to the need. There are many other things needed, but I feel that the desks are so important that it is better to ask for this one thing for the schools.

The cordial friendliness with which I have been greeted by the people of Madbury is highly appreciated. The friendly counsel of the Board members and the loyalty of the teachers have made the year's labor one of increasing satisfaction. May I say in conclusion that I have not come into the town with the intention of running the schools. The School Board is perfectly capable of doing that and was elected for the purpose. I am willing, however, to do my part and want to take my place as a citizen in the towns where I work to promote the welfare of the boys and girls of the community.
