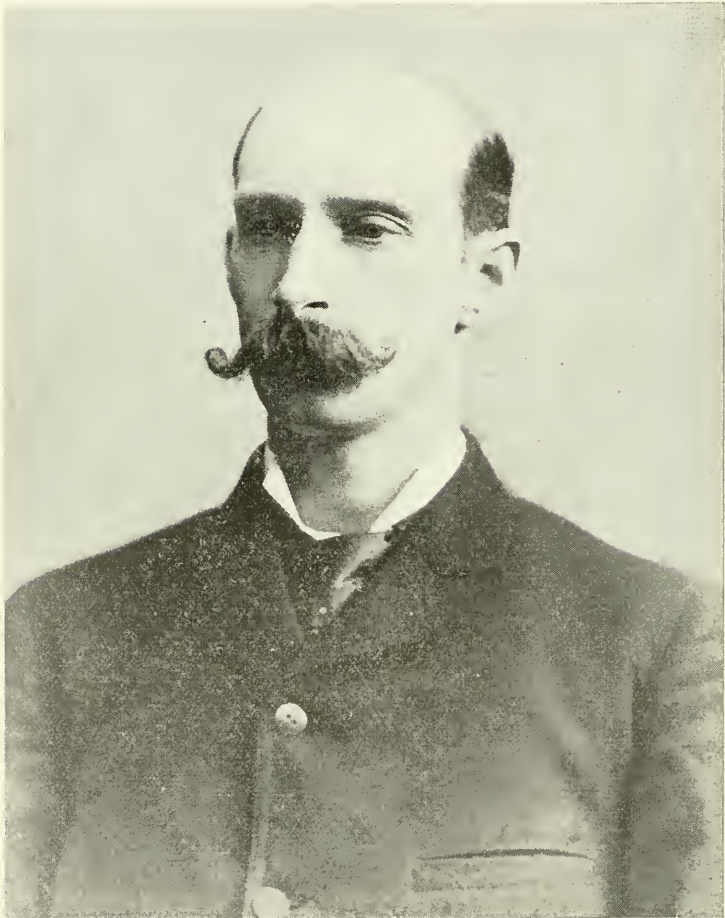

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

Town of Madbury

March 8, 1938

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the eighth day of March, A. D., 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.

ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

ART. 7. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 9. To see what action the town will take as to acceptance of state aid for road construction:—

To vote to raise \$543.00 to be matched by \$1,086.00 by the State for State Aid Road or,

To vote to raise \$247.31 to be matched by \$989.25 by the State for Class V Roads.

(NOTE:—All State Aid Construction must be maintained by the Town after completion.)

ART. 10. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current ear.

ART. 11. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I have the honor to present my ninth annual report. All statistics are for the school year ending June 30, 1937.

There has been little change in the enrollment of pupils in the two schools, both being full but not overcrowded. In Dover High School there are fourteen pupils. If they all remain for the year we shall have a deficit of \$200.00 for tuition and this should be provided for at the annual district meeting. Four of the high school pupils are seniors, so about the same amount of money should be needed for next year.

There was very little sickness among the children last year and you will note that the attendance record is the highest in years. Miss Macdonald continues as School Nurse and at this writing has just completed testing the hearing of the pupils with the audiometer loaned by the State Board of Education. I am happy to say that she found no child's hearing seriously affected. I was pleased to see so many having their teeth looked after at the Dental Clinic. The health and safety of the children should be of prime importance and for this reason I again call your attention to the lack of water facilities at both schools. After the opening of schools in September the North School was equipped with screens and their installation helped to abate a bad fly nuisance. I recommend that the Center School should be screened next summer, although the plague of flies is not quite so great there owing to a smaller number of breeding places in the vicinity of the school. An excellent steel flag pole was erected at the Center School

at small expense. Both school buildings are in fair repair but the North School needs to have its underpinning repaired.

There has been no change in teachers. There is no such thing as "compulsory education." We can demand that the pupil attend school but his or her education must result from personal effort and right attitudes. The old adage holds, "You can lead a horse to water but you cannot make him drink." Parents can do much by encouraging a will to learn on the part of their children and by themselves maintaining right attitudes in supporting the efforts of the teachers.

We thank the School Board for continued support and their appreciation for the good work being done by their teachers. We desire the cooperation of all.
