WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING
TOWN OF MADBURY
March 11, 1952

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of
Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to
vote in Town affairs—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the 11th of March A. D. 1952 at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles.

ART. 1. To choose the following town officers:

A town clerk for the ensuing year.

A selectman for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer for the ensuing year.

A collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Two auditors for the ensuing year.

A trustee of trust funds for the ensuing three years.

ART. 2. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$7500. in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

- ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$289.63 for class V highways to match the sum of \$1,930.85 to be contributed by the State.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62.00 for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.
- ART. 8. To see what action the Town will take on repairs and alterations to the Town Hall.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an Inspector of Buildings who shall hold office for a term of one year, and by vote fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by Section 17, Chapter 176, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Building Regulations as authorized under Chapter 18-21 inclusive, Chapter 176, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of

one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended.

ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.

ART. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

ARTICLE 1. Balloting for town officers:

For Town Clerk: Edna P. Twombly received 24 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Selectman: Richard G. Hale received 51 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

For Treasurer: Dorothy W. Rogers received 40 votes and was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Collector of Taxes: Paul M. Raynes received 51 votes, Fred E. Gerrish 14 votes and John S. Elliott 1 vote. Paul M. Raynes having the majority of votes cast was declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Auditors: Albert Evans had 28 votes and Edward Moore 28 votes and these two were declared elected for the ensuing year.

For Trustee of Trust Funds: Clarence Felker had 2 votes, E. W. Putney had 2 votes, L. B. Wormhood 2 votes, John H. Rowe 2 votes, and Frank Fenerty, having 11 votes and the majority cast, was declared elected for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to appoint all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 3. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow up to \$7500 in anticipation of taxes until the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE 4. Voted not to raise the \$52 asked for the use of the Seacoast Regional Development Association.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise \$289.67 for Class V highways to match the sum of \$1138.59 to be contributed by the State.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to refer the proposed Zoning Law and Building Code back to the Planning Board for revision in line with comments made during this meeting, a copy of the revision to be put in the hands of every voter and a public hearing to be held within three months.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to accept the proposed budget with a reduction of \$3052 from the total, leaving \$30,762.79 for the Town budget.

ARTICLE 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Voted not to allow the Selectmen to license Beano games in the town, by a count of 31 to 5.

Voted that the report of the Planning Board be accepted and filed with the records. A rising vote of thanks was given the Planning Board for their work.

The report of the Fire Chief was presented.

Voted to table indefinitely the appeal from the City of Dover for help in making up their hospital deficit.

Personally appeared the officers elected and took the oath of office as prescribed by law before Moderator Kenneth S. Morrow.

REPORT of SUPERINTENDENT of SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Madbury:

During the past year there have been very few problems facing the administration of your schools.

Your boys and girls continue to do well in Dover, Rochester and Durham except for a few reports of truancy (?).

Due to the fact that more children are being transported it became necessary to add more seats in the school bus. This was good business as it prevented a possible extra trip.

A LOOK IN THE FUTURE

There have been rumors that the Madbury students would not be allowed admission in the new Woodman Park School in Dover, also that Dover schools are overcrowded and Madbury will be forced out in a couple of years. These rumors coupled with the establishment of the air base in Newington can give cause for much concern.

The towns of Durham and Lee are also facing problems relative to overcrowding and need for building. The school boards of these towns are greatly concerned over the future.

One solution seems to be a cooperative school district comprising Durham, Lee, Madbury and any other interested town in this locality. There have been several meetings regarding this matter and it is hoped that enough information will be gathered to present a preliminary discussion town meeting day. This is a matter that requires the unbiased thinking of all the residents of Madbury.

If the schools are to be "the people's schools" in the truest sense, it is essential that the people share in the basic decisions which affect them.

This report will be followed by charts showing census and tuition pupils.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board and the Citizens of Madbury for their fine cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

To the Citizens of Madbury—

Although the year 1951 was the busiest year since the Fire Department was organized, damage by fire was small except for the Newhall house which was a total loss. The increase in the numbers of calls was due to chimney fires.

The spring of 1951 was a period of great forest fire danger. One of the worst days in forestry records occurred in early May. Special precautions were taken during that period in order that calls might be answered more quickly.

On October 23 our largest and only brush fire occurred. At 2.30 P.M. a fire escaped from a faulty incinerator and in a few minutes had covered about two acres before being brought under control. Fortunately no expense was incurred as the State will not share in the expense of extinguishing fire which can be traced to a faulty incinerator. The owner is held fully responsible under Forest Fire Laws.

Incinerators are considered as open fires and should meet certain safety requirements and require a season permit. Burning in incinerators should be done in the early morning or after 4.00 P.M. on damp days. For further information contact your fire warden or one of his deputies.

During the year the Fire Department pumped out three cellars and burned grass on four fields.

In the past fall a series of programs was planned to increase the attendance at the monthly Fire Dept. meetings.

All residents of Madbury are cordially invited to join the Fire Department and enjoy our programs and help

supply valuable fire protection which Madbury could not otherwise afford.

BUILDING REGULATIONS SUGGESTED FOR TOWN ADOPTION

1. The inspector of buildings shall be the administrative officer of this ordinance. He shall receive applications and fees for the erection or alteration of buildings and electric wiring thereof as provided in this ordinance, shall keep complete records of all applications and his action on the applications; promptly survey and inspect all buildings, alterations, or uses proposed, accept and deposit with the Town Treasurer all fees collected by him under this ordinance, and may issue permits for erection, alteration, or remodeling of all buildings, and the use of land, if in his opinion the proposal complies with the law of the state, this ordinance and other town ordinances and by-laws, provided that in any instance where license or permit fees for uses are required his permit shall constitute only an approval on which the proper authority may issue a license on payment of required fees; any other duties prescribed by law, shall act in cooperation with the fire warden in any matter in which their duties as prescribed by law may coincide or conflict; and shall take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the selectmen.

2. No building construction shall be started; no alterations of existing buildings of an estimated cost of more than \$200. undertaken, and no building shall be put to any different use than on the day of enactment of this ordinance until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this ordinance.

3. No application for a permit required by this ordinance shall receive action by the building inspector unless made in writing. All applications for a permit to build, construct, alter or remodel any building shall be accompanied by a sketch or plan of the proposed building or al-

terations, and a statement of its intended use when built, constructed, altered or remodeled. A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all permits issued.

4. Upon receiving such application the building inspector shall promptly take such action as may be indicated in the way of investigation or public hearings to acquaint himself with the merits of the application. He may, without judging the application on its merits, refer the application to the board of adjustment. If, however, he finds the proposed building, alteration, or use of building to conform with the law and this ordinance he may at once issue the permit in writing over his signature. If he finds the proposal in any conflict with the law or this ordinance he shall fix whatever restrictions or conditions on the proposed construction or use as may be in his best judgment, right and proper, or for reasonable cause refuse the permit.

5. No building or structure shall be erected, altered, rebuilt, substantially repaired, or remodeled unless in compliance with the following:

a. *Commercial building.* No building intended or designed to be used for industrial, commercial, or other public use shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose which does not provide non-combustible walls and partitions between its component parts.

b. *Exits.* No building intended or designed for any public use or congregation of people shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose which does not provide adequate exits.

c. *Garages.* No public garage for the storage of five or more automobiles, or having any service or repair enterprises connected therewith shall be erected, altered, or enlarged unless the building is so constructed or the proposed alterations, enlargements or extensions shall be of slow-burning or non-combustible material, ex-

cept that use of automatic sprinklers may obviate the use of such slow-burning or non-combustible material.

d. *Roofs.* No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with non-combustible or fire resistant roofing materials.

e. *Fire-stops.* No building of wood or other combustible material shall be erected, altered, remodeled, or enlarged without providing fire-stops in every combustible wall or partition, at every floor and between floor joints at every partition.

f. *Chimney construction.* No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof unless containing a tile or brick lining and with an iron clean-out door at or near its base, and shall extend at least three feet above the roof. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material.

g. *Thimbles.* No wall paper or other combustible material shall be laid over any thimble or thimble hole in any chimney.

h. *Smoke pipes.* No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material, between the pipe and the combustible material.

i. *Electric wiring.* No electrical wiring shall be extended or installed in any building, or in any reconstruction, alteration, or remodeling of any building unless such extension or installation shall comply with the regulations and amendments to regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, known as the National Electric Code.

j. *Foundations.* All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the building inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.

k. *Minimum building area.* Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of five hundred square feet.

l. Outside walls shall be constructed of materials commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted.

m. *Severage.* All dwellings and all commercial, public or industrial buildings shall be equipped with town sewer entrance, cesspool, septic tank, sanitary chemical closet or approved vault, subject to the approval of the building inspector.

n. *Exceptions.* The construction of small accessory buildings not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance.

6. *Board of Adjustment.* The selectmen shall appoint a board of adjustment of five members, one of whom may be a member of the planning board, said board to serve without compensation. The Board of Adjustment shall

have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result. NOTE: Where a Board of Adjustment exists by reason of action for zoning or subdivision control, the first sentence should be deleted from the ordinance.

7. *Amendment.* This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

8. *Enforcement.* Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of each violation.

9. *Takes effect.* This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

10. *Conflicting provisions.* Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance, or other regulation, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall govern.

11. *Validity.* If any section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court or competent authority such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this ordinance.
